

Unsupervised computer use can have the same dangerous result.



The Facts

One in three children are exposed to unwanted sexual material

One in seven children are sexually solicited online

One in eleven children are subjected to threatening or other unwanted behavior directed toward them

According to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children Youth Internet Safety Survey (2007)

Family Rules

Make it a family rule to:

- **Never** give out identifying or personal information (home address, school name, phone number, workplace or age) in chat rooms or bulletin boards (including social networking sites);
- . Know the lingo used by teenagers;
- **<u>Utilize</u>** the filtering features built into the more popular internet browsers and software programs that filter areas known to be inappropriate for children;
- Never allow your children to arrange a face-to-face meeting with someone they've "met" online unless you're with them;
- Only allow your child to use the computer or internet capable gaming system in a common area of your home and in the presence of an adult;
- Talk to your child about what sites he or she uses on the internet and visit them together;
- **Obtain** your child's screen names and passwords. Be sure that screen names are age appropriate and do not reveal personal information such as, real name, age, school (including mascots), or hobbies;

and

 Use the parental conrol settings on your computer to check the internet history and to archive chat sessions. Install a keystroke logger if you think that will help you track your child's activity.

Checklist: Danger Areas

Checklist: Warning Signs

- Does your child spend an unusual amout of time chatting online?
- Has your child stopped hanging out with friends after school and on weekends?
- Does your child get anxious or upset if he or she is not able to get to a computer to chat or check email or to send cell phone text messages?
- · Have you noticed a change in your child's personality?
- Is your child isolating him or herself from friends and family?

- Does your child have a sudden influx of cash from an unexplained source?
- · Is your child getting gifts through the mail?
- · Is your child exhausted because of being online all night?
- Does your child use a pre-paid phone card to make calls to a person you don't know?
- Is your child too attached to his or her cell phone or afraid to miss a call?

Chat Features

Most internet chat programs have the ability to activate and save a history of all chat sessions. This can be a valuable tool when it comes to making sure your child is not conversing with the wrong people. Below, please find the ways to activate the feature on two of the more popular chat tools. Yahoo IM and MSN Messenger.

To activate chat logging in Yahoo Instant Messenger:

- · Click on "Messenger" tab on the top left of the screen.
- Click on "Preferences."
- · Select "Yes, save all of my messages."
- · Click "Apply."

To view logged messages:

- Click on "Contacts" tab on the top of the screen.
- · Click on "Message Archive."
- · Click on "Messages folder."

To activate chat logging in MSN Messenger:

- Click on "Show Menu" icon.
- Click on "Tools,"
- · Click on "Options."
- · Select "Messages" from the left side.
- · Under "Message History," check "Automatically keep a history of my conversations."

To view conversations:

- Click on "Show Menu" icon.
- Click on "File."
- · Click on "View Message History."
- Select one of the "Friends/Contacts" if you're asked to make a selection, then click "Ok." Your message history with this person will be revealed showing every saved message since you began saving messages.
